At the Board meeting that evening, the proposals from Finch's for the 3M 3400 System, and from Bell & Howell, were submitted for your consideration. However, two or three questions were raised for which

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microfilm and other frems necessary for the trial run.

Previous to this, Finch's brought over a 3M 3400 Camera and a Model 400 CT reader-printer, for demonstration and trial. Later, I spent some time in Boise at their 3M products center watching equipment operation and discussing pertinent details.

During the intervening period between June 15 and now, Mr. Meyerhoeffer and I have undertaken a quite extensive study of microfilm systems. As the result, we recommend that we do not confine our microfilming storage and information retrieval to either roll, cartridge, or jackets but that we use the 3X5 microfilm jackets for all individual student records and personnel

With this in mind, we recommend that the bid from Finch's be accepted, and that the Board authorize the purchase of the following items:
