



Re: Default Prevention

A large part of the higher default rate at CSI is something that we are not able to control. The Federal Government's Department of Education is very inspired in its quest to make the Direct Loan Program grow and be successful. At the current time, they are approving

Briefly I will describe the process that happens when a students wants to get a loan at the College of Southern Idaho.

Step 1. Loan Origination

The student tells us in writing that they would like a loan for educational expenses. We go into our Loan tab in the Federal government's Electronic Data Exchange (EDE) Software and fill in the amount, the type of loan (either Subsidized or Unsubsidized) and the expected disbursement dates (we are required by regulation to

Step 2. Promissory Note

The student is told at the time they originally talk to us to come back in a couple days to sign a promissory note for the amount of the loan. We ask them to come back because we do not issue a promissory note until the U. S. Dept of Ed gives approval to

makes no difference, because the U. S. Dept of Ed never turns down a borrower any way.

Step 3. Disbursement of Funds

After the U. S. Dept of Ed approves a borrowers promissory note and prior to our disbursing the loan money to the student, we are required to have the student attend a loan entrance interview session.

At these loan sessions, the student is told that they are about to embark on a very serious venture that will affect their future earning power. They are very distinctly told that the money is a loan and that they will be required to pay it back. They are also told to look at their needs and to only borrow what they feel that they will need for basic educational expenses. They are required to sign a statement that they went to the loan session and the College is required to have that statement in the student's file.

After the student has participated in a loan entrance session, we disburse funds to the student from College of Southern Ideha funds. Immediately after the student picker their money from the business office, we record that disbursement into the EDE software and send that information to the Dept of Ed. The Business Office then requests a reimbursement of funds from the Federal Government for the money disbursed to the individual students.

We continually attempt to stay in reconciliation with the U.S. Dept of Ed to make sure that the amount of money that we disburse to the students is equal to the amount of money that we get back.

At a point when the student is getting ready to leave the College of Southern Idaho,

the U. S. Dept of Ed is very serious in wanting to get its money back someday. The consequences of not paying back the money are very clearly covered. Various

It is at this point that we are no longer in the loop of the Direct Loan Program. At the point that the student has received their money from us, a loan is called "booked" and the relationship is between the U. S. Dept of Education and the student. All is fine until the student fails to pay back their loan; then the U. S. Dept of Ed and the school now have a relationship, called Loan Default Management.

I believe that we do a very thorough job at the College of Southern Idaho in loan default management. We follow the regulations carefully and document information for the student files. If students who have loans leave the institution without completing a loan exit interview, we place a hold on their academic and business office records. We have become firmer in the last year or two about requiring the student to actually sit through at

tor a total of \$6625 and \$7500 respectively. If a student is with us for three years, they could potentially have \$21,625 in loan debt with only an Associate Degree. It is very difficult to find employment in our local market area that would allow a person to shoulder that much debt on top of their other living expenses.

To discourage these types of loans, we talk individually to the students that are requesting the extra money, stressing an awareness of what this kind of debt load will mean to their future. We also require the student to take a two page written essay test related to the entrance loan booklet that the U. S. Dept of Ed provides. Students often accuse us of only putting this thing in front of them as another hurdle they must jump—and they are correct. We do want to discourage the extra debt.

I believe that given the Federal Governments desire to see this program grow, we are doing what we can to control our end of the equation. We will probably want to have a brainstorming session with the you, other administrators, the Business Office and our office to determine if there is more that we could be doing. Sorry about the long windiness, but I do feel that this is an important issue to us here at CSI, both from a public relations standpoint and also from a helping-students-to-accomplish-their-life
