2. Mary Beth Crane made a presentation concerning health insurance for students traveling on college sponsored foreign trips. She stated that colleges she contacted required students to have health insurance and to be made aware of repatriation insurance.

College attorney Robert Alexander recommended that the college require all students traveling on foreign trips to obtain personal health insurance.

Ms Crane also noted that most schools require a waiver

The administration is to develop a formal application process for trips that will insure that the proper precautions have been taken. The Board directed that no foreign trip be taken to an area that was not recommended by the United States State Department.

Mike Mason was directed to look into the cost of providing workman's compensation insurance for faculty taking students on trips. Repatriation insurance is also to be investigated.

3. Dr. Joan Edwards and Char Hagemann explained the college's Albertson's Foundation grant. The grant is for implementing a program for both four-year teaching majors

As you know, CSI faculty advisors for overseas trips are already doing many of the actions recommended

The following recommendations for guidelines for CSI travel are taken or adapted from the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs "Guidelines for Responsible Study Abroad: Health and Safety". In this memo I concentrated on offering recommendations for health and safety since I felt those were your areas of concern.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That CSI create an "assumption of risk and release statement" such as the one used by Ricks College (copy attached).

- 4. That faculty advisors conduct appropriate inquiry regarding available medical services in the countries to be visited.
- 5. That faculty advisors provide clear information to students so they and their parents/guardians/families will have adequate information concerning preparation for, participation in and behavior while on the trip.
- 6. That faculty advisors provide orientation (either a course or required meetings) to trip participants,

violation of appropriate behavior standards.

potential participants, their disciplinary history, and other factors that could impact on the trip.

9. That faculty advisors provide information for trip participants and their parents/guardians/families regarding when and where CSI's responsibility ends, and the range of participants' out-of-country experiences that are beyond CSI's (the program sponsor) control. In particular, program sponsors generally:

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- a. Cannot guarantee or assure the safely of participants or eliminate all risks from the study abroad environments.
- b. Cannot monitor or control all of the daily personal decisions, choices and activities of individual participants.

c. Cannot prevent participants from engaging in illegal, dangerous or unwise activities.
