We used the proposed CSI calendar as a basis from which to begin each of the next three years. Each district will attempt to begin its student year at the same time in the fall that CSI begins its student year. They will end their initial

begins its second semester. They will try to end their school year by the end of May or the first couple of days in June. They will add staff days, inservice days, etc. as needed before, during, and after the 180 day period.

Since school districts have a greater number of days they must be in session than de the next searchest institutions, they cannot "fit" their calendars to CSI's with any real exactness. Nevertheless, their proposed calendar structure fits your institution's schedule better than they had previously. A couple of areas where problems still exist occur during second semester. The districts' second semester begins a week after CSI begins its second semester. There is no way they can begin earlier if they start their first semester when your institution begins its school year. Given that beginning time, and since they have semesters that are so much longer than CSI, they cannot position spring break at a time that is logical for them and equal to yours. Therefore, the districts' calendar has positioned spring break the week after CSI has scheduled its spring break.

They have requested that I inquire of you regarding whether you might be able and/or willing to amend your calendar to: a) begin your second semester one
