We opened bids for two Division of Public Works preventative maintenance projects over the last two weeks.

The first project was the fire lane replacement by the gym. This project involves the replacement of the fire lane and the construction of a turnaround circle large

Level 1

A level 1 offense is when a student violates the substance abuse policy. Student will be required to attend a 2-hour drug education seminar. An example of this violation may include, but is not limited to: possession of alcohol under age or sustained presence in a room where other alcohol policy violations are taking place.

Level 2

A level two offense is when a student violates the substance abuse policy for a second time or when a student's use of substances causes personal or personal control to the student will attend the 2-hour education seminar. Students will also be referred to counseling services, a 12-step program and a letter sent to their parents if under the age of 21. Examples of this violation include, but are not limited to: pessession of marijuana, drug paraphernalia, large quantities of alcohol, kegs or beer balls, or use in public or common areas, participation in drinking games, or a repeat of a level one offense.

Level 3

A level three offense involves behavior that suggests the excessive consumption of alcohol or other drugs, or leads to an alcohol or other drugrelated arrest. At this level, the student's parents will be notified, the student

marriqual encumstances. This level of severity may require that the student

procure kegs, or otherwise engage in sponsoring behavior, which is unsafe, by its nature are considered to be responsible for a level three offense.

Level 4

A level four offense is when substance use results in behavior that leads to potential or actual harm to self or others. The student will likely be suspended or separated from CSI and could face referral to the local law enforcement agency. Some examples might include, but are not limited to: growing, manufacturing, selling, or distributing illegal substances, selling or

Failure to Comply:

If students choose to not participate in the required activities relative to their violation of the drug and alcohol policy the student may be suspended from CSI.

Sample Letter and Policy

(Currently used at Florida State University)

Students under the age of 21 are subject to the parent/guardian notification

or the student and university.

Conditions under which parent/guardian will be notified:

- 1. As a rule, upon the finding of responsibility for the first alcohol or drug related offense. The student will be required to attend a 2-hour educational seminar.
- 2. Students, who violate level two, three or four of the substance abuse policy are subject to parental notification in either written or verbal form, if they are under the age of 21.
- 3. Student affairs administrators reserve the right to exercise professional judgment and discretion in the application of this policy.






CSI February 20, 2002 Traffic Count


- Counted for a 9 hour period on a higher attendance day Wednesday
- Counts were on 15 minute intervals to identify the busiest times of day
- Counted the number of cars making each possible maneuver (see map)
- Busiest 15 8:45 Second 12:45 Third 11:45 Fourth 9:45 Fifth 1:45
- East Entry is busiest with 1880 entries and 965 exits
- West Entry had 822 entries and 1295 exits
- Trend looks like the majority enters at the east entry, and exits from the west entry
- Having said that, the east entry is still strong with 965 exits as well
- Total car maneuvers in and out over the 9 hour period -4,962 = 551.3/hr = 137.8/15 min.
- Exits to the west number 663 from both entries
- Exits to the south number 49 from the east entry only
- Exits to the east number 1548 from both entries
- Most popular entry is E2 with 863
- Most popular evit is 11 with 256

Whenever Falls Avenue is busy and we have high volumes of east bound cars exiting from our campus entries, there are problems due to crossing westbound traffic to gain refuge in the median before easing into the second lane going east. Any south bound exits (which there are a few), or pedestrians crossing seem to complicate things even further.

Whenever there are cars backed up on the main campus arteries, attempting to exit campus, and simultaneously high volumes of automobiles are entering campus – attempting to cross traffic lanes immediately after entering (see maneuver 9) – a dangerous backup of traffic into the west bound lane of Falls can occur. Another problem that presented itself was when the same scenario mentioned earlier exists, and cars attempting to exit to Falls from the East parking lot attempt to cross the entering line of traffic from Falls (E,W or S 2)

PROFESSIONAL TECHNICAL CENTER OPERATION

There have been a number of concerns registered about the duties and responsibilities of the parties involved in the construction and operation of the secondary school Regional Professional-Technical Center located at the College of Southern Idaho. This letter of agreement is an attempt to outline the resolution of some of these concerns.

Program Designation

The Twin Falls School District plans to transfer the following programs from Twin Falls High School to the Professional-Technical Center in the fall of 2003, when the center opens: a) Information Technology, to include software and hardware applications; b) Agriculture Technology; and c) Health Services. These programs will be enhanced during the 2002-2003 school year via cooperation and coordination between TFSD and

College of Southern Idaho will provide in-kind assistance. A key outcome will be to assure a curriculum that results in student certification in at least one career path area

TFSD will also include sections of English and mathematics at the site in an effort to integrate academic components with technical components in a fashion similar to that of

Occupations, will have a distance learning component that will provide program services using distance delivery to districts that have students participating in the program on the CSI campus and to districts that have students who participate from their home school only.

The Twin Falls School District Board will request involvement, participation, and commitment from school districts in the area immediately via a letter inviting said involvement and via a presentation at the Region 4 Superintendents' Association meeting

in December. Districts that agree to participate will be invited to have a role in the program development as it evolves by sending representatives to the program planning sessions outlined in the aforementioned section.

The TFSD will also be amenable to providing a location for ARTEC administration within the technical center facility.

The College of Southern Idaho will provide limited access for TFSD technical center programs to its wide area network and to its microwave broadcasting system in an effort to enhance the delivery of programs using advanced technologies. Any connection with the college system that compromises the college network will be removed. Access to the CSI network will be made available at times when it does not conflict with the CSI

technical support from one high school to another will be assessed at actual cost to the TFSD. CSI will also allow a connection between its wide area network and the TFSD wide area network so that TFSD and the technical center can remain associated with one another. In the event that expenses are incurred fees will be for actual costs. CSI and

ARTEC Involvement

The TFSD Board of Trustees will continue its involvement in the ARTEC Consortium as long as the consortium remains a viable entity in the region; i.e., as long as a significant number of Magic Valley Districts participate financially in ARTEC. Once TFSD's portion of financial support for ARTEC extends beyond 25% of the locally generated funds needed to operate ARTEC, the district's involvement in the consortium will need to be annually approved by the TFSD board. Currently, ARTEC provides its members with coordination services, curriculum alignment services, professional development services, and telecommunications services/equipment. The TFSD will avail itself of

ARTEC-Net at the regional technical center. TFSD will also work within ARTEC to

Facility Construction Logistics

The TFSD Board of Trustees proposes to construct a facility of approximately 60,000 square feet to house current and future technical programs for secondary students in the Twin Falls School District and Magic Valley. The proposed site location is undeveloped acreage immediately North of the Herrett Center bordering North College Road, immediately East of the East access road depicted in the CSI Master Campus Plan. The TFSD will submit a \$7,000,000 bond issue question to the public in late February or early March of 2002, the purpose of which will be to pay for this construction and equipment

As part of the construction project, TFSD will provide the infrastructure needed to accommodate a new facility on an undeveloped plat of land; that being, attachment to

gutter along the length of the project area and will pipe and cover the ditch that runs

The College of Southern Idaho will lease the property upon which the technical center is situated to TFSD for \$1 per year for the next 99 years. CSI will be responsible for any sewer and water upgrades required to meet the needs of other college facilities being planned in the future for the area around the technical center. CSI will also be responsible to pipe and fill the length of culvert along North College that extends beyond the limits of the technical center. CSI will also be responsible for creating sidewalks, curbs, gutters,
